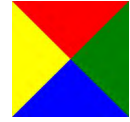
From the Principal...

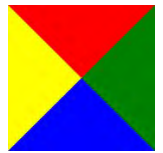

Learning how to build and program a robot, beginning with the basics, was the focus of a recent series of workshops for regional students, including four from Dubbo College Delroy Campus.

Organised by the Dubbo School of Distance Education (DSODE), the First Robotics workshops were presented by two engineers from Macquarie University during a three-day period.

DSODE teacher Don Bates said the First Robotics program would be rolled out regionally following the initial workshop series.

“During this week’s workshops we involved Dubbo College, St John’s College, Macquarie Anglican Grammar and Year 7 to 10 distance education students who were already here for residential week,” he said.

“In addition we had a Year 8 distance education team with one student travelling four-and-a-half hours to get here for the workshop.

The Dubbo School of Distance Education will act as a hub for the program and our science head teacher Andreas Shepley will run training for teams from other regional schools in the near future.

“Students and teachers this week have really enjoyed the course and they are being invited to apply for a grant for robotic kits for their schools.”

First Robotics is a franchise of Macquarie University, which is keen to see the program operating in regional, as well as city schools.

During the workshops students begin with construction and programming basics, building on these skills as they add different sensors including touch and ultrasonic sensors. Mr Bates said coding for the robots was icon-based using an iPad and Bluetooth.

Delroy students were accompanied to the workshop by Mr Scott Edwards and Ms Emmi Smith

7ART3 Pet Drawings

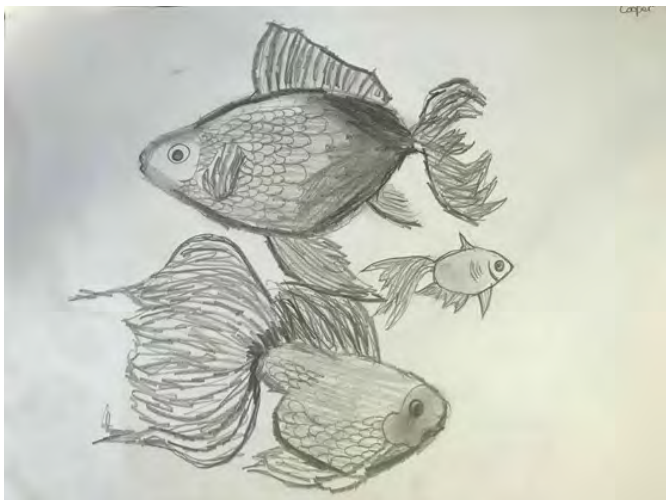

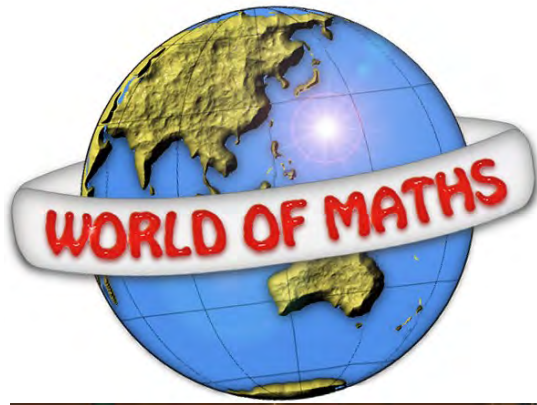

News from Maths.....



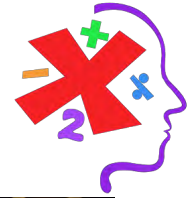
On Friday the 19th of May, the Mathematics Department was able to facilitate a visit to Delroy Dubbo College Campus the “World of Maths” roadshow.

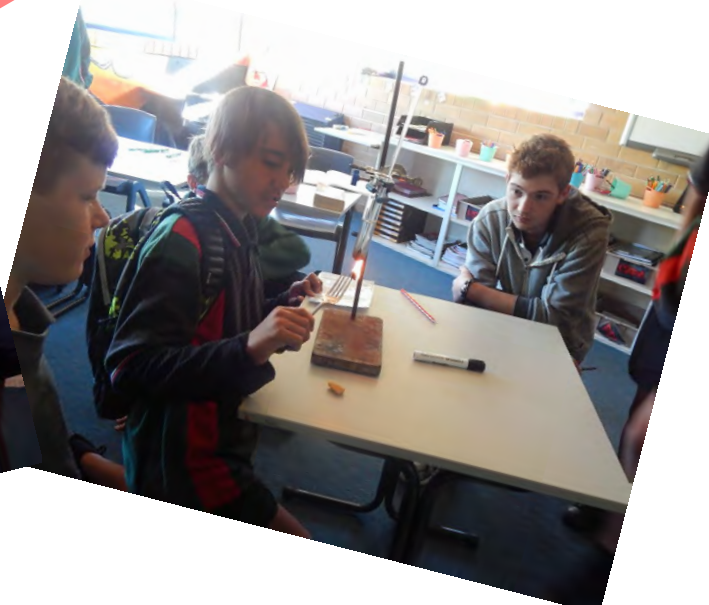

STRIVE CLASS SCOOP.....

I am amazed at how quickly the term is progressing! Students in the Strive class will complete the Maths and Science exams in Week 6 with the rest of the Year 8 cohort.

A reminder to parents and caregivers, the students do receive regular Maths homework designed to build upon the skills developed in class and to provide reinforcement of work studied earlier in the year. It is disappointing that there have been numerous instances where students have not done their homework. I do not issue homework for the sake of it - I am trying to build a strong foundation for students' skill development and understanding. If students are not applying these skills on a regular basis, they are not accessing opportunities to consolidate their learning. I used the metaphor of a house needing a strong foundation and mortar to hold the bricks together as being the concepts I need students to be practising on a regular basis. If not, we can still lay bricks upon each other but they're not going to be strong or reinforced without the mortar. If students in this class really are going to strive, they need to also be committing to work outside of class hours to build upon this.

Students have completed the first part of their *My Story, Your Story* assessment task (an in-class activity). They have also begun working on telling the story of an inspirational Australian. Despite class time being provided, students are urged to work on this during their own time. This task is due in week 8 (15/6/17) with students choosing the mode in which they will deliver this task. In Science, we have explored the organelles within a cell and made our own edible jelly plant and animal cells. Photos of these accompany this article.

Students continue to take part in a range of hands-on activities designed to develop their social and personal capabilities as well as their employability skills throughout their Initiative Games lessons. Some of these activities can also be seen in the accompanying photos. Thanks again to Woolworths Delroy Park for your continued partnership with the Strive class, allowing us to cater afternoon tea for Homework Centre on a fortnightly basis.

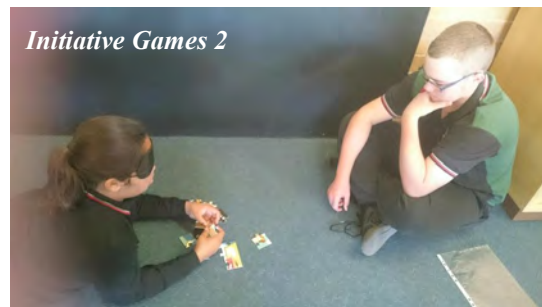

A*TV: This is free online Tutoring available from Sydney University. There are many features to this website such as connecting live to an expert online to share files, draw problems and discuss solutions. Checkmate allows students to upload their essays and get feedback within 24 hours. All students in Years 9 and 10 have been sent this through their school emails and there is a poster on the Careers Notice board inside the Library door. This site runs from 3pm – 10pm Sunday to Friday.

Year 10 Work Experience. This is available at any time throughout the year as long as students do not have exams or major assessment tasks on. Students are encouraged to attend work experience. All Year 10 students need to do, is go to the library and see the Careers Adviser to get a student pack with a Student Placement Record which has to be signed by employer, parents, student and lastly, the Careers Adviser, before the student can legally attend work experience.

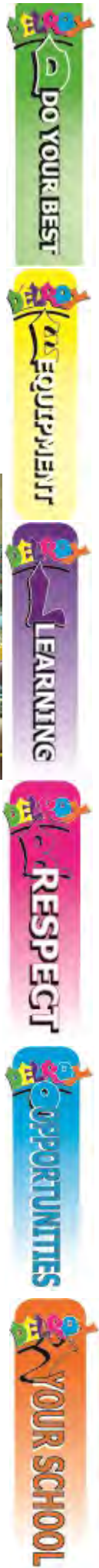

Compulsory School Attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age. The *Education Act 1990* requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the Board of Studies, Teaching and Educational Standards for homeschooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An *Application for Extended Leave* may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.





My child won't go to school. What should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education and Communities may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

- Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

- Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department

may apply to the Children's Court for a *Compulsory Schooling Order*. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

- Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to [complete their schooling](#).

Working in Partnership

The Department of Education and Communities recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.

If a student misses as little as 8 days in a school term, by the end of primary school they'll have missed over a year of school.

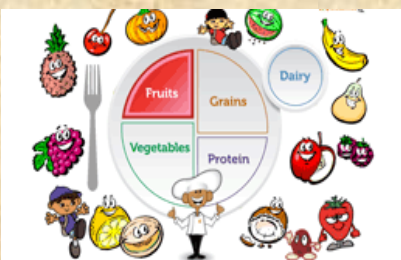
