As the term begins to wind down, Science classes have continued to explore the biological world and broaden their knowledge. All classes have completed their second topic test which should help students evaluate the effort they have been putting into their studies this term.

Year 10 have continued to explore the wonders of biotechnology, with many classes being asked to debate the ethics of the use of stem cell research or human cloning. These debates have allowed students to challenge their own beliefs and to think "outside the square".

Year 9 have been eagerly learning about their immune system and how it fights diseases to keep us healthy. Several

classes have conducted experiments to test the claims of anti-bacterial soaps by growing bacteria colony on agar plates, with many being surprised at the end results. Some classes have also had the opportunity to see the creative ways the immune system can be presented by analysing the science behind the movie Osmosis Jones.

Year 8 have moved on from the human body systems to exploring the systems found in plants. This has given classes the opportunity to view plant tissue under the microscope or watch coloured water move through a stalk of celery while others have been lucky enough to dissect a variety of flowers to see how plants reproduce.

Year 7 Have been looking at how

ecosystems can be rehabilitated from natural disasters, like bushfires and the impact of humans, such as land clearing, to ensure that biodiversity continues to thrive in Australian ecosystems. As reported last newsletter, some Year 7 classes were tasked with designing their own animal with adaptations suited to a chosen environment. Below are just some of the fantastic beasts that were found in the classrooms of Year 7.

Next term will see all year groups tackling the world of Chemistry, which can only mean one thing – Bunsen burners will finally get used!!

Chicken Little

This term, Ms Hockey's class incubated and hatched chickens as part of their Science and Agriculture units. Four fertilized eggs from the Ag farm were placed in a small incubator in the classroom.

Over the course of 21 days the students took turns every morning and afternoon, rotating the eggs and topping up the water, to maintain a consistent the humidity inside incubator. Three weeks into the process the students got to see the chicks hatch firsthand. Three out of the four eggs hatched successfully.

The three chickens were then transferred to a chicken coop with a heat lamp to continue to grow. The students all practiced taking care of and cleaning up after the little animals. One morning the students returned to the class to find a chick missing. Amazingly, later that day, a local community member arrived at school stating that their cat had brought the chick home in its mouth last night. Uninjured, the chick which was now named 'Lucky' and reunited with the others.

The chicks continued to grow and develop in the classroom until week 9



where they were taken down to the Ag farm to live in a larger enclosure. The students all enjoyed learning about the lifecycle of a chicken this term.
